Course Description: Through candidate presentation of analyses in the middle and terminating phases we try to formulate ideas about the identifying aspects of these two phases. We will look at interventions during these phases with particular attention to the role of analyst activity. Is interpretation sufficient or are other forms of activity warranted.

Learning Objectives: Following this course, participants will be able to:

- (1) Discuss and detect middle and terminating phases in analysis
- (2) Hone his/her ability to intervene in ways appropriate to the phase of analysis

Bibliography: Nothing is required. I would suggest reading Ed Tronick's recent book on Discord. Although written for the public, it raises issues quite appropriate for analysis.

Experience soon showed that the attitude which the analytic physician could most advantageously adopt was to surrender himself to his own unconscious mental activity, in a state of evenly suspended attention, to avoid so far as possible reflection and the construction of conscious expectations, not to try to fix anything that he heard particularly in his memory, and by these means to catch the drift of the patient's unconscious with his own unconscious.

--Sigmund Freud, 1923

Course Description: Anna O, Joseph Breuer's celebrated patient, called her treatment the "talking cure." A fuller truth is that psychoanalysis is a listening and talking cure. In this continuous case conference we will be listening closely to process notes from analytic sessions. Our particular focus will be on analytic

listening itself and the many questions that emerge when we draw our attention to how the two parties are listening to each other. What distinguishes analytic listening from ordinary listening? Are there different modes of listening that may be optimal during a session, and if so what determines the use of one particular type? How might the analyst's listening attitude fluctuate between poles of "credulous" and "skeptical" listening styles? What do we listen for? Do we listen to words, gaps between words, silences, non-verbal behaviors, or the music of affect that pervades the analytic session? How do we listen openly to the free associative process, and what happens when we adopt an attitude of listening "without memory and desire. Can we observe our own process of welcoming (or rejecting) emotional experience generated in the moment-to-moment encounter with our patients? Does our listening stance promote open receptivity to everything, even the most foreign, ego dystonic or disturbing things the patient may convey? And what effect does our capacity to listen openly have on the patient's free associative process? We will try to have one presenter over the course of the four weeks in order to follow the process of the analytic dyad over time. Optional materials are offered to stimulate curiosity and generate more questions about listening in the analytic space.

Learning Objectives: Following this course, participants will be able to:

- (1) Demonstrate increased capacity for listen more openly to unconscious communication from the patient, countertransference, and the process of the hour.
- (2) Demonstrate increased sensitivity to the ways that our analytic listening shapes our interventions and affects the analytic process.
- (3) Practice using the class as a consultation group to expand our thinking about how we listen to clinical material.

Course Description: We will explore how we attribute meaning to analytic encounters by exploring the subjective experience of the analyst, the patient, and the relationship between them, leaning on concepts from Balint to Ogden.

Learning Objectives: Following this course, participants will be able to:

- (1) Increase awareness of the interpersonal context and intersubjective field created by the interplay between transference, countertransference, and resistance within the analytic relationship.
- (2) Identify "anchors" and "milestones" in the analytic process indicating the depth and development of the analytic relationship.
- (3) Increase dialogue among different and, at times, contradictory opinions regarding the analytic process within the group discussion.
