# Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion in Psychoanalysis and Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy

In 2020, the Holmes Commission on Racial Equality in the American Psychoanalytic Association (APSA) was formed at the recommendation of Black Psychoanalysts Speak. When APSA accepted the recommendation, it formed a group of high-level psychoanalysts to examine systematic racism within psychoanalysis. Dorothy Holmes was named chair and Anton Hart, Dionne Powell, and Beverly Stoute were appointed as co-chairs of the Holmes Commission.

# Message from PPP Committee Chair

Happy New Year! It's an enlivening and optimistic time for the Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Program (PPP) faculty and the planning committee, as we see the current class of students complete their second and final year of coursework. These curious students piloted a new diversity course. They investigated ways that culture and its systems of power enter their therapy offices, and how treatments are impacted by their identifications, both conscious and unconscious, with specific categories and groups. Students and instructors were excited, challenged, and moved by this successful course, and we plan to include it in the PPP curriculum.

This is also the time of year that the PPP Committee is busy meeting with prospective students and preparing for our next cohort to start in September 2023. The PPP provides training for mental health professionals who want to investigate, discuss, and practice psychodynamic methods and principals in their clinical practices. In 2007, the program founders recognized the importance of this training and started the PPP at OPC. Since then, there have been 6 student cohorts and a total of 43 graduates. Please join me by acknowledging and thanking the individuals who founded the PPP. They focused a tremendous amount of time and care into creating a dynamic and rewarding program. The founders include Ann Dart, Linda Miller, Peter Armstrong, and Martha Graner.

The benefits of the PPP echo throughout the region as mental health professionals and their clients reap its rewards. **Jolie Krechman**, **PhD**, a PPP graduate in 2009, who went on to do analytic training, describes it this way:

"At a time when I was feeling somewhat isolated professionally, the PPP afforded me an opportunity to connect with a group of like-minded peers to learn together, think together, and develop professionally. The environment was warm and welcoming, and the faculty, dedicated and enthusiastic. It was an invaluable experience and one that I reflect on with both gratitude and fondness."

Sarah Schrott, LCSW, also a PPP graduate in 2009, describes her experience in the PPP:

"Going through the Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Program was a freeing and exciting experience for me. I had had little exposure to psychoanalytic theory and technique in my graduate training so it was with some trepidation that I entered the program. I am glad I did! I came out of it with a deeper appreciation and knowledge of the complexity of the human experience and the unconscious. I learned to listen to my patients with greater depth and curiosity. I developed a way of sitting with patients that leaves room for the unknown and for the possibility of the patient's distinct individual experiences to emerge. My work deepened, my patients benefited, my private practice stabilized and I became a part of a vibrant community of clinicians from whom and with whom I continue to learn and grow. I am ever grateful to OPC and the PPP!"

# **OPC Program Updates**

The Oregon Psychoanalytic Institute (OPI) is an adult psychoanalytic training program that provides psychoanalytic training to licensed mental health professionals. Psychoanalytic training consists of four years of didactic seminars in psychopathology, development, psychoanalytic theory and technique, as well as continuous case seminars. This course work is accompanied by a personal psychoanalysis and a minimum of three supervised control cases at a frequency of four times a week on the couch. Candidacy continues post seminar until the requisite years of supervision of control cases have been completed.

This rigorous training provides the clinician with a solid foundation in psychoanalytic theory beginning with Freud and includes all of the major and current schools of thought that inform contemporary, pluralistic, psychoanalytic thinking. It is hoped that the clinician will be able to understand each of the main branches of the psychoanalytic tree and their relationship to one another and integrate this knowledge into their overall comprehension and practice of contemporary psychoanalysis.

We are pleased to welcome our four recent graduates onto the OPI faculty and look forward to their continued contributions to the Institute and to the psychoanalytic community. There are currently three first year candidates and eight advanced candidates. We will be celebrating at least one new graduation in June. We are accepting new applications for our next class to begin in 2024. 
